Existing or Proposed Text:

Arriving in New Mexico in 1911 seeking treatment for tuberculosis, First Lady Carrie Wooster Tingley, became an advocate for sick and disadvantaged children and in 1937 was instrumental in establishing Carrie Tingley Hospital in Hot Springs (Truth or Consequences), NM. The hospital moved to Albuquerque in 1981 where it remains today. Carrie is remembered for her generosity and love of children.
