Revistas, Maromas, and Carpas

Trapeze and juggling acts, song, dance, and dramatic performances were part of traveling vaudeville-style shows called *revistas* that brought fun and entertainment to families throughout New Mexico in the nineteenth and early twentieth centuries. Many were family based and included acrobatics, or *maromas*, performed under a small tent, or *carpa*—the name by which they were sometimes known. Originating in Mexico with roots in Aztec culture, they often presented humor reflecting cultural differences between Mexican-American and Anglo traditions. Most ended with the onset of WWII.

Florinda Naranjo Ortiz 1900-1939

Born in the one-time coal town of Dawson, Florinda Ortiz was part of a family-based *carpa* known as La Compañía Hermanos Ortiz, which toured the Southwest in the early twentieth century. With her husband, Jose Ortiz, and five children as performers, Florinda sang blues songs, including "St. Louis Blues," and acted in comedy skits, while her husband performed magic acts dressed as *El Gran Payaso Tamborín* (Tamborine, The Great Clown). She was also a healer, selling herbs on her travels. Generations of her children became musicians and singers.
